

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SYNOPSIS



Ray Cohen couldn't be happier. His only daughter is two weeks away from being married, his wife has finally forgiven him for botching the house renovation, and the local rabbi loves his plans for the new synagogue, which means a huge contract for Ray.

Then in walk his future in-laws, and the mother, it turns out, is his girlfriend from thirty years ago - before she converted to Judaism. Ray's been acting like a good Jewish mensch to his wife and daughter forever, so he needs to pull out all stops to keep the secret from coming out. But he has even bigger problems when he discovers the rabbi's had a stroke, leaving the synagogue plans that were supposed to pay for the over-the-top wedding in the hands of his rollerblading youngest son, Rabbi BB.

To cap it all off, Ray thinks he may have lost his ketubah, which means his daughter can't prove she's Jewish, which means she can't get married, which means his wife will kill him.

His day had started so well...

GLOSSARY

Shule - Synagogue.

Machatonim - A special familial relationship for which there is no English word. Your machatonim are your son's/daughter's parents-in-law (and visa-versa).

Chuppah - The canopy under which a traditional Jewish wedding ceremony is performed. **Mischpocha -** The entire family. Not only immediate relatives but everyone including those related by marriage.

Ketubah - The Jewish wedding contract. **Mensch -** A decent bloke.



Rob Selzer - PLAYWRIGHT & CO DIRECTOR

Distracted by medical school then a career in psychiatry, Rob finally found time to try out his creative writing skills a few years ago. Then after winning his first writing competition, he summarily quit his day job. But maybe he shouldn't have been so hasty - he now earns just enough from freelancing to keep the family pooch in dog food but not much else.

Steven Curtis - CO DIRECTOR

Steven was the founding chairperson of Saltpillar back in 1988 and remains as co-chairperson today. The company was borne out of the creative and experimental AUJS Comedy Revues in 1986 & 1987. In that period Steven has acted in a number of plays, including Biloxi Blues, Witness for the Prosecution, Laughter on the 23rd Floor, Other Peoples Money and The Chosen.

He has produced multiple productions. After all that, this is his directorial debut – He thought, "how hard can it be?". He is so grateful that he had Rob's shoulder to cry on and Pip's shoulder to lean on. In all it has been a truly satisfying experience.



Niki Saltzman - PRODUCER

One of Niki's favourite pastimes is her involvement in the performing arts, and she is thrilled to be working with the Saltpillar team once again on "The Importance of being Jewish". Her interest in Theatre began with her involvement in the Art Direction, Set-Design/Construction, Make-Up & Production for the AUJS Revues, Stop Making Soup, Meshugar Babies, and For Liver or For Wurst.

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Ray JOE TIGEL

Joe was practically born on the stage with his father Shia a stalwart of the Yiddish theatre spanning from the vibrancy of prewar Poland to the Kadimah stage here in Melbourne. With a performers DNA, early school years at Sholem Aleichem Sunday School and SKIF youth movement were a blur of musical performances, recitals and short plays – mostly in Yiddish. Being mesmerised by Hayes Gordon performing Tevye in Fiddler on the Roof in 1968 became an inspiration for this aspiring actor.

In High School, apart from majoring in distractions, Joe had lead roles in musical theatre productions including the Pyjama Game and Damn Yankees and some challenging roles such as Azdak in Brecht's Caucasian Chalk Circle. As a teenager, the Kadimah stage was a second home and small roles in Yiddish productions including the 'Kishefmakherin' and The Megille (Purim Shpil).

As a young adult, roles in Yiddish theatre included Peter in The Diary of Anne Frank, the nephew Ben in Neil Simon's Sunshine Boys, King Ahaverosh in the Megille and the coveted role of Tevye in Fiddler on the Roof in 1997.

This is Joe's fourth production with Saltpillar, with previous roles in Big Al, Falsetto's and Asher Lev. Off the stage, Joe is the current President of the Kadimah Cultural Centre and Co-Chair of the Jewish Arts Quarter. He is married with two beautiful daughters and loads of chutzpah and attitude to contend with at home.

Over fifty years on and behind the stage includes many variety nights, musical and comedy acts and MC at many a community event.

He remains available for your weddings Bar/Bat Mitzyah's and Brit.









Rosh NATALIE SHOSTAK

Natalie's theatre credits include 'Low Level Panic" (Claire)- which toured VIC and NSW, 'As you Like It' (Celia), 'The Changeling' (Beatrice-Joanna), and 'The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie' (Sandy), to name a few.

Natalie worked for the Oxford Children's Theatre before moving overseas to study and graduate Dux of her year at Drama Studio London.

In television she has been seen in Henderson Kids, Prime Time and Neighbours as well as numerous commercials.

Natalie has appeared in three previous Saltpillar productions - 'Witness for the Prosecution', 'Other People's Money' and most recently, 'Solomon's Secrets'.

Raoul has acted in a number of Saltpillar productions including The Suicide, the hit comedies, Biloxi Blues, Beau Jest, Play it again Sam and Solomon's Secrets.

In addition to this, he has played and compered Theatresports and other Saltpillar activities. A long serving Chairperson and current Co-Chair of Saltpillar Theatre, Raoul has been involved in radio, TV and has performed numerous stand-up comedy routines.

He has also acted as host and MC for many community groups and functions. Not to mention he does trivia nights and charity auctions . . . available for bar mitzvahs, weddings and funerals.









Kitty AMELIA FRID

Amelia has always enjoyed being creative. From the days of Bialik's drama productions, Amelia learned to find her voice on stage. This evolved into screen roles: Celia (Stephanie Burke) in 1989, Neighbours (Cody Willis) 1989 – 91, and the mini-series Adventures on Kythera (Molly) 1991, followed by a return to the stage to play Princess Balroubador in a pantomime production of Aladdin (Oxford, UK, 1992).

A long sojourn from acting followed, in which time Amelia focused on her studies, career and growing her family. A focus on craft of a different

kind ensued: painting, construction, make believe, and lounge room dance-off sessions (often all at once, before afternoon tea and nap time). To misquote Tim Burton, the pursuit of creativity is the opportunity to reconnect with the way you saw things as a child.

After acting in Saltpillars' 2019 production of 'Solomon's Secrets', Amelia is once again thrilled to have the opportunity to return to this craft, and be amongst like minded, gorgeously supportive souls to bring the vision of The Importance of Being Jewish to life.







BB DANIEL TEITELBAUM

Daniel first appeared on the stage in a minor role as a marsupial in Mount Scopus Memorial College's grade three production of Magic Possum, in 1996. Daniel had been method acting the role in years previously and gave a standout performance.

After studying media and theatre in high school and university, and developing a deep appreciation of the stage, the screen, and the art of evoking pathos, laughter and ennui from audiences, Daniel co-starred in a viral YouTube video that was based on a previous viral YouTube video.

After riding someone else's viral coat tails, Daniel went on to ride further coat tails in 2019, co-writing, producing, and performing in the critically acclaimed comedy cabaret The Illegitimate Love Children of Bob Downe and Magda Szubanski.

Currently Daniel appears on radio on Southern FM, 3RRR, and ABC radio fortnightly and shares the reins of the production company Velcro Couch. Daniel is excited to play BB; a roller-blading irreverent and happy-go-lucky son of a Rabbi makes up a big part of Daniel's astrological profile.





Leo MIKKI PALTI

Mikki Palti returns to Saltpillar Theatre for The Importance of being Jewish. His last production with the company was as Eugene Jerome in 2005's production of Brighton Beach Memoirs.

Some of Mikki's other credits include Richard III, The Prince of Egypt, Into the Woods, Cosi, The Hunting of the Snark, and as Cyrano De Bergerac at Top Class and Top Acts for excellence in theatre performance.

Mikki is also the author of the dystopian adventure story Time, Light, and Other Myths, and a two-time guest speaker at Comic-Con. Mikki would like to thank his family and friends for their incredible support!



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
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
